

The Employment Analysis Report provides a monthly update on the status of the New York City labor market through employment, unemployment, and wage statistics. It is drafted by the Economic Research & Policy group at NYCEDC.

## Report Summary

- This month's release of April employment data revealed that New York City lost 814,600 private sector jobs, by far the largest decline in a single month on record. This takes the city's private sector job total down to its lowest level since October 2010.
  - Two industries heavily impacted by shutdown orders, Accommodation & Food Services and Retail Trade, suffered the heaviest job losses in April (-216,000 and -88,900, respectively).
  - Health Care & Social Assistance, one of the main drivers in employment growth over the past decade, has now lost 7.5% of jobs over the last year, with hard-hit subsectors including Offices of Physicians (-26.8% year-over-year) and Child Day Care Services (-19.7%).
- The 10.1 percentage point jump in the city's unemployment rate was also the largest on record; the city's current unemployment rate of 14.2% is the highest since the current methodology began in 1976.
- Job losses year-over-year have disproportionately impacted low-wage workers, which is reflected in the fact that inflation-adjusted average weekly earnings increased 2.9% in April compared to one year prior.

## Private and Total Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

Private sector payroll employment in New York City fell by 814,600 in April 2020 from a month earlier, according to employment data released by the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL), analyzed by New York City Economic Development Corporation's (NYCEDC) Economic Research & Policy group (data incorporate seasonal adjustments). Government jobs in the city fell by 16,900, resulting in a net decrease of 831,500 private and public sector payroll jobs.

Revised data for March 2020 indicate that private jobs fell by 81,700 and total jobs fell by 81,300 from the prior month. For the 12 months ending in April 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 885,000, a decrease of 21.8 percent. Employment at the national level fell 14.5 percent during the period.

Table 1 summarizes city, state, and federal payroll employment data. (Numbers include all persons employed in the city/state, regardless of place of residence.)

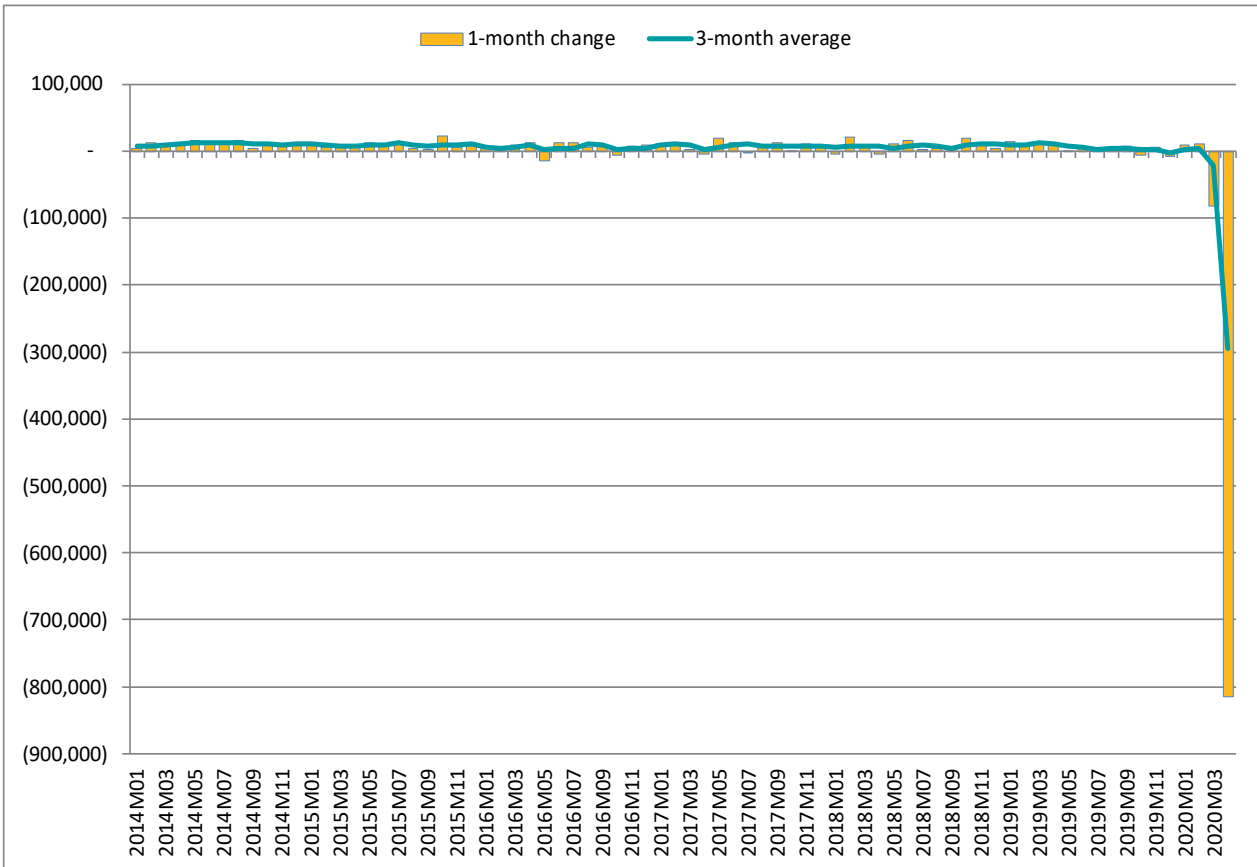

### Unemployment and Labor Force

(Numbers include all city residents, regardless of place of employment.)

New York City's unemployment rate rose from 4.1 percent to 14.2 percent from March to April 2020. The number of employed city residents fell by 560,300 from March to April, while the number of unemployed residents rose by 373,000 over the same period. The labor force participation rate fell from 58.8 percent to 56.0 percent between March and April. Table 2 summarizes city, state, and federal unemployment data.

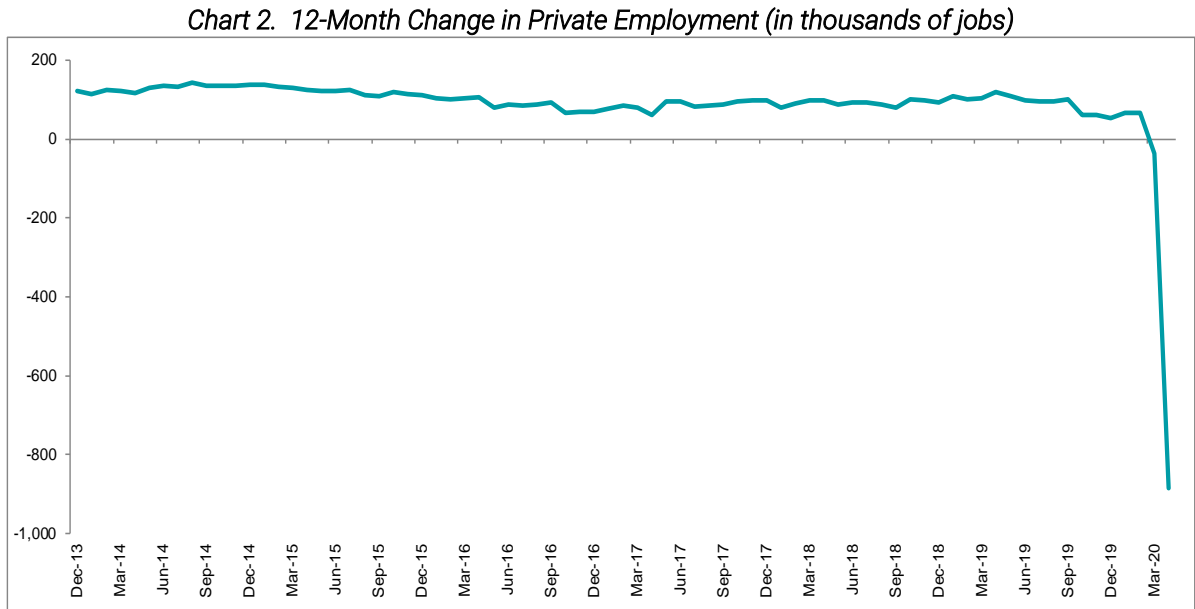
## Sectoral Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

### 12 Months Ending April 2020

In the 12 months ending April 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 885,000, a decrease of 21.8 percent, compared to the national rate of -14.5 percent during the period.

Chart 2 reports the 12-month change in New York City private employment from December 2013 to April 2020.

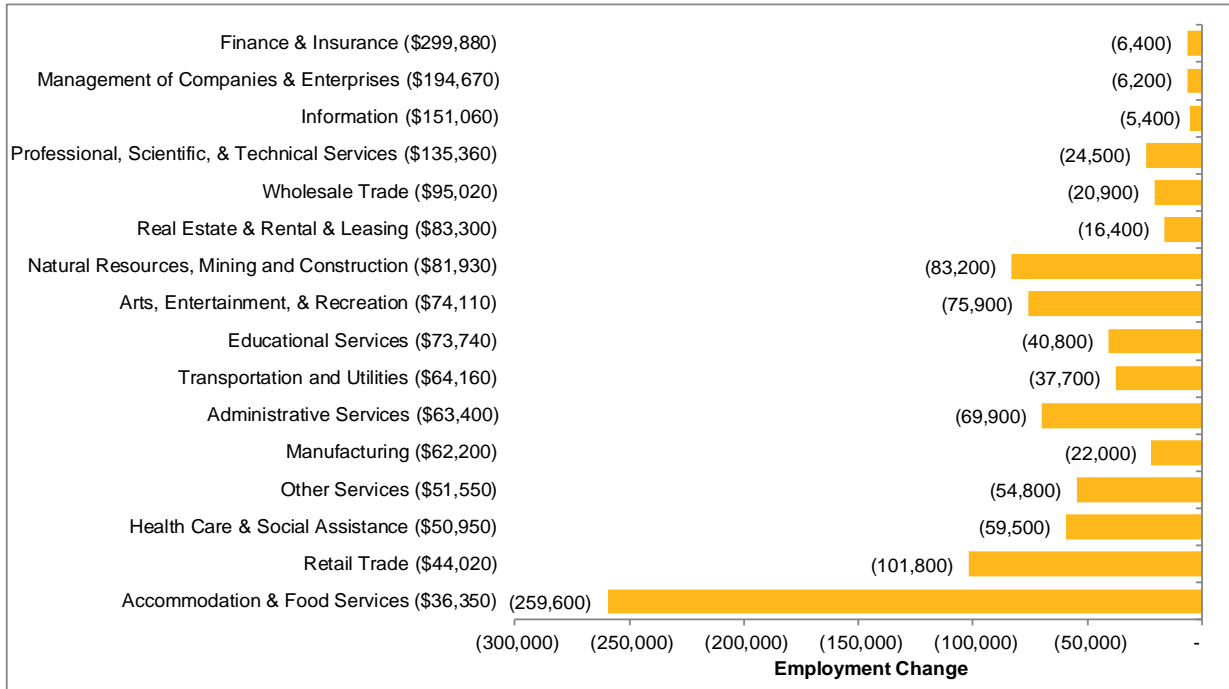

Employment in the Accommodation & Food Services sector declined by 259,600 jobs in the 12 months ending in April 2020. Retail Trade jobs fell by 101,800. There were no sectors that added jobs year-over-year.

Chart 3 reports the sectors that contributed to employment gains in the year ending April 2020.

**Chart 3. Change in New York City Private Employment by Industry, 12 Months Ending April 2020, by 2018 Average Wages**

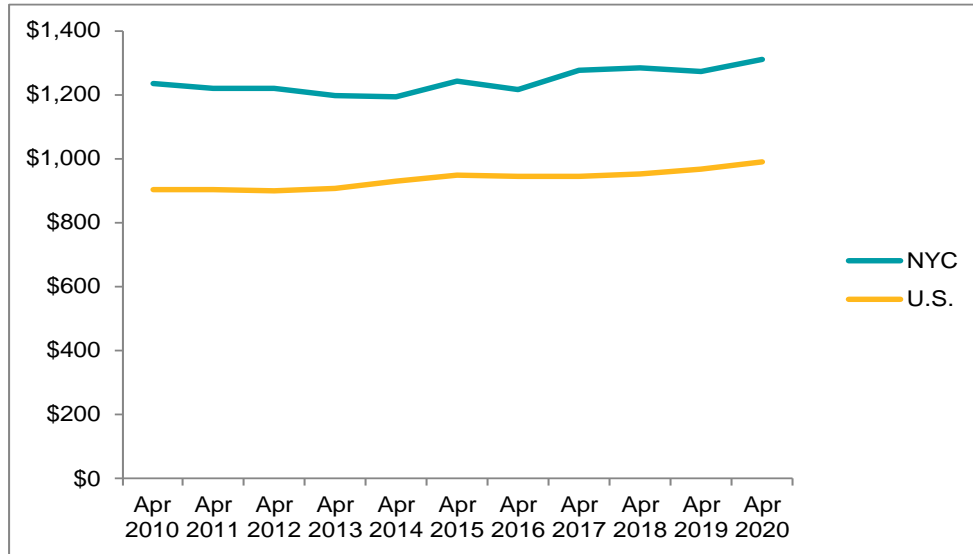

Private sector employees in New York City earned \$40.05 per hour and worked 32.7 hours per week, on average, in April 2020. The resultant average weekly earnings figure of \$1,310 is up 2.9 percent from the inflation-adjusted average from one year prior.

Chart 4 shows the average weekly earnings of private sector employees in New York City.

## Month-to-Month

Finance & Insurance had the strongest growth between March 2020 and April 2020, adding 4,300 jobs.

The Accommodation & Food Services sector experienced a decline of 216,000 jobs month-to-month. Retail Trade jobs fell by 88,900, and jobs in Health Care & Social Assistance fell by 87,700. This is not an exhaustive list of sectors experiencing declines month-to-month.

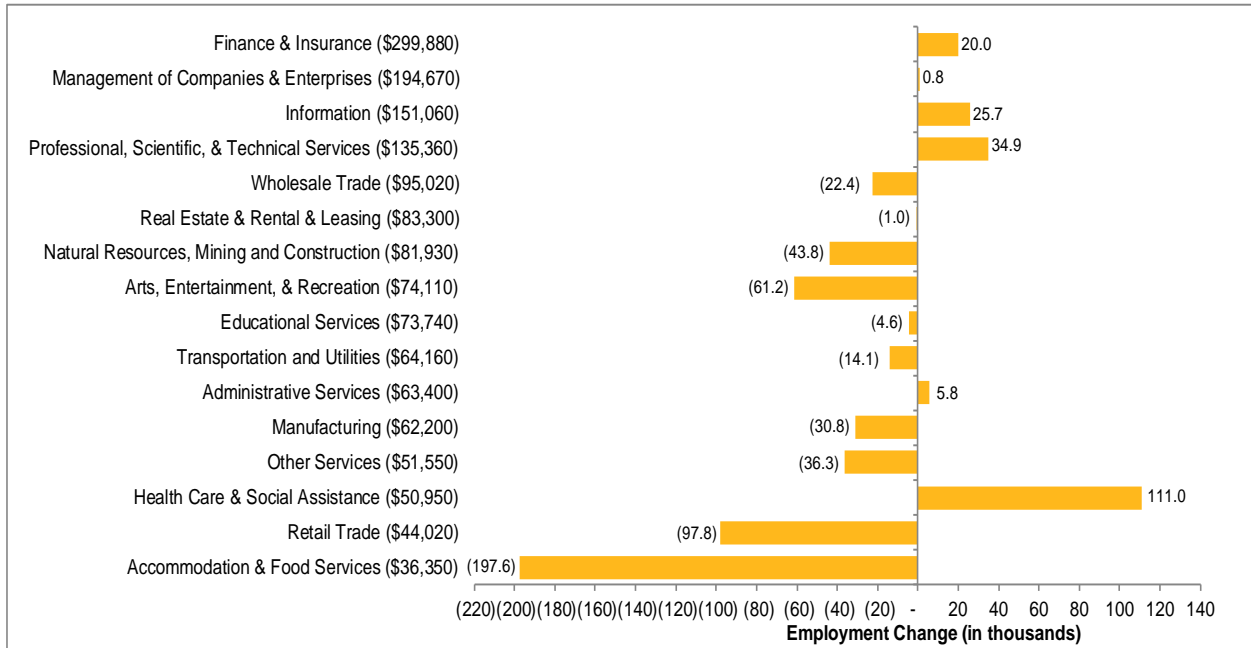
