

Report Summary

- This month's release of August employment data revealed that New York City gained 58,100 private sector jobs, following an increase of 86,200 in July. The city lost nearly 900,000 jobs from February to April.
 - o The sector that added the most jobs was Accommodation and Food Services, which grew by 13,500 jobs.
 - o The Wholesale Trade sector experienced the largest decline, losing 400 jobs.
- The city's unemployment rate fell to 16.0 percent in August, while labor force participation fell to 59.7 percent.
 - o Employed residents increased by 148,400, while the number of unemployed residents fell by 158.500.
- Private sector payroll jobs fell by 602,700 from August 2019 to August 2020, a decrease of 14.9 percent. Private sector jobs fell by 7.5 percent nationwide.

Private and Total Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

Private sector payroll employment in New York City rose by 58,100 in August 2020 from a month earlier, according to employment data released today by the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL), analyzed by New York City Economic Development Corporation's (NYCEDC) Economic Research & Policy group (data incorporate seasonal adjustments). Government jobs in the city rose by 53,500, resulting in a net increase of 111,600 private and public sector payroll jobs.

Revised data for July 2020 indicate that private jobs rose by 86,200 and total jobs rose by 16,700 from the prior month. For the 12 months ending in August 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 602,700, a decrease of 14.9 percent. Employment at the national level shrank 7.5 percent during the period.

Table 1 summarizes city, state, and federal payroll employment data. (Numbers include all persons employed in the city/state, regardless of place of residence.)



Unemployment and Labor Force

(Numbers include all city residents, regardless of place of employment.)

New York City's unemployment rate fell from 19.9 percent to 16.0 percent from July to August 2020. The number of employed city residents rose by 148,400 from July to August, while the number of unemployed residents fell by 155,500 over the same period. The labor force participation rate fell from 59.8 percent to 59.7 percent between July and August. Table 2 summarizes city, state, and federal unemployment data.


Sectoral Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

12 Months Ending August 2020

In the 12 months ending August 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 602,700, a decrease of 14.9 percent, a larger decline than the nation (-7.5 percent) during the period.

Chart 2 reports the 12-month change in New York City private employment from December 2013 to August 2020.





Employment in the Accommodation and Food Services sector declined by 168,700 jobs in the 12 months ending in August 2020. Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services jobs fell by 68,100, and Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation employment fell by 62,400. There were no sectors that added jobs over the past year.

Chart 3 reports the sectors that contributed to employment gains in the year ending August 2020.

Private sector employees in New York City earned \$39.44 per hour and worked 34.3 hours per week, on average, in August 2020. The resultant average weekly earnings figure of \$1,353 is up 4.7 percent from the inflation-adjusted average from one year prior.

Chart 4 shows the average weekly earnings of private sector employees in New York City.




Chart 4. New York City Average Weekly Earnings, Private Sector

Month-to-Month

Accommodation and Food Services had the strongest growth between July 2020 and August 2020, adding 13,500 jobs. Retail Trade added 6,500 jobs, and Health Care and Social Assistance added 6,300. This may not be an exhaustive list of sectors experiencing gains month-to-month.

The Wholesale Trade sector experienced a decline of 400 jobs month-to-month.


