# October 2020 EMPLOYMENT ANALYSIS REPORT

The *Employment Analysis Report* provides a monthly update on the status of the New York City labor market through employment, unemployment, and wage statistics. It is drafted by the Economic Research & Policy group at NYCEDC.

#### **Report Summary**

- This month's release of October employment data revealed that New York City gained 14,700 private sector jobs, following an increase of 28,600 in September. The city lost nearly 900,000 jobs from February to April.
  - The sector that added the most jobs was Accommodation and Food Services, which grew by 12,700 jobs.
  - The Finance and Insurance sector experienced the largest decline, losing 4,500 jobs.
- The city's unemployment rate fell to 13.2 percent in October.
- Private sector payroll fell by 553,900 from October 2019 to October 2020, a decrease of 13.5 percent. Private sector jobs fell by 6.2 percent nationwide.

#### Private and Total Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

Private sector payroll employment in New York City rose by 14,700 in October 2020 from a month earlier, according to employment data released today by the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL), analyzed by New York City Economic Development Corporation's (NYCEDC) Economic Research and Policy group (data incorporate seasonal adjustments). Government jobs in the city fell by 23,600, resulting in a net decrease of 8,900 private and public sector payroll jobs.

Revised data for September 2020 indicate that private jobs rose by 28,600 and total jobs rose by 75,500 from the prior month. For the 12 months ending in October 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 553,900, a decrease of 13.5 percent. Employment at the national level shrank 6.2 percent during the period.

Table 1 summarizes city, state, and federal payroll employment data. (Numbers include all persons employed in the city/state, regardless of place of residence.)

Chart 1 shows monthly private employment change and 3-month rolling average since January 2014.




Chart 1. Monthly Private Employment Change and 3-month Average, January 2014 to October 2020

#### Unemployment and Labor Force

(Numbers include all city residents, regardless of place of employment.)

New York City's unemployment rate fell from 13.9 percent to 13.2 percent from September to October 2020. Table 2 summarizes city, state, and federal unemployment data.


#### Sectoral Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

#### 12 Months Ending October 2020

In the 12 months ending October 2020, the city's private sector payroll jobs fell by 553,900, a decrease of 13.5 percent, a larger decline than the national rate (-6.2 percent) during the period.

Chart 2 reports the 12-month change in New York City private employment from December 2013 to October 2020.








Employment in the Accommodation and Food Services sector declined by 146,400 jobs in the 12 months ending in October 2020. Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation jobs fell by 59,200, and Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services lost 57,500. This is not an exhaustive list of sectors that have lost jobs. There were no sectors that added jobs over the past year.

Chart 3 reports the sectors that contributed to employment gains in the year ending October 2020.

Private sector employees in New York City earned \$38.61 per hour and worked 33.6 hours per week, on average, in October 2020. The resultant average weekly earnings figure of \$1,297 is up 1.1 percent from the inflation-adjusted average from one year prior.

Chart 4 shows the average weekly earnings of private sector employees in New York City.




Chart 4. New York City Average Weekly Earnings, Private Sector

#### Month-to-Month

Accommodation and Food Services had the strongest growth between September 2020 and October 2020, adding 12,700 jobs. Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services added 7,600 jobs, and Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities added 5,900. This is not an exhaustive list of sectors experiencing gains month-to-month.

The Finance and Insurance sector experienced a decline of 4,500 jobs month-to-month. Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services jobs fell by 3,500, and jobs in Other Services fell by 2,900. This is not an exhaustive list of sectors experiencing declines month-to-month.




