

Report Summary

- This month's release of May employment data revealed that New York City gained 62,500 private sector jobs, following an increase of 51,000 in April.
 - The sector that added the most jobs was Accommodation and Food Services, which grew by 19,500 jobs.
 - No sector lost jobs between April and May.
- The city's unemployment rate fell to 10.9 percent in May, while labor force participation fell to 61.5 percent.
 - o Employed residents decreased by 26,300, while the number of unemployed residents decreased by 26,700.
- Private sector payroll rose by 373,300 from May 2020 to May 2021, an increase of 11.6 percent. Private sector jobs increased by 10.4 percent nationwide.

Private and Total Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

Private sector payroll employment in New York City rose by 62,500 in May 2021 from a month earlier, according to employment data released by the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL), analyzed by New York City Economic Development Corporation's (NYCEDC) Economic Research and Policy group (data incorporate seasonal adjustments). Government jobs in the city rose by 800, resulting in a net increase of 63,300 private and public sector payroll jobs.

Revised data for April 2021 indicate that private jobs rose by 51,000 and total jobs rose by 52,800 from the prior month. For the 12 months ending in May 2021, the city's private sector payroll jobs grew by 373,300, an increase of 11.6 percent. Employment at the national level grew 10.4 percent during the period.

Table 1 summarizes city, state, and federal payroll employment data. (Numbers include all persons employed in the city/state, regardless of place of residence.)

Unemployment and Labor Force

(Numbers include all city residents, regardless of place of employment.)

New York City's unemployment rate fell from 11.4 percent to 10.9 percent from April to May 2021. The number of employed city residents fell by 26,300 from April to May, while the number of unemployed residents fell by 26,700 over the same period. The labor force participation rate fell from 62.2 percent to 61.5 percent between April and May. Table 2 summarizes city, state, and federal unemployment data.

Sectoral Payroll Employment

(Numbers include all persons employed in the city, regardless of place of residence.)

12 Months Ending May 2021

In the 12 months ending May 2021, the city's private sector payroll jobs grew by 373,300, an increase of 11.6 percent, faster than the national rate (10.4 percent) during the period.

Chart 2 reports the 12-month change in New York City private employment from December 2013 to May 2021.


The Accommodation and Food Services sector added 82,000 jobs in the 12 months ending in May 2021. Health Care and Social Assistance jobs increased by 78,800. Retail Trade jobs increased by 60,000.

Employment in the Finance and Insurance sector declined by 5,600 jobs in the 12 months ending in May 2021.

Chart 3. Change in New York City Private Employment by Industry, 12 Months Ending May 2021, by 2019 Average Wages



Private sector employees in New York City earned \$41.6 per hour and worked 34.0 hours per week, on average, in May 2021. The resultant average weekly earnings figure of \$1,414.4 is up 7.8% percent from the inflation-adjusted average from one year prior.

Chart 4 shows the average weekly earnings of private sector employees in New York City.

Month-to-Month

Accommodation and Food Services had the strongest growth between April 2021 and May 2021, adding 19,500 jobs. Information Services added 9,400 jobs, and Health Care and Social Assistance added 8,000. This is not an exhaustive list of sectors experiencing gains month-to-month.

No sectors experienced employment declines between April 2021 and May 2021.


